Notes and corrections

- 1 Coriolanus was directed by (and starred) Ralph Fiennes, Joseph's brother.
- 2 The 'official' title of the opera is *La fanciulla del West*. The correct English translation is *The Girl of the West*, but it is frequently referred to as *The Girl of the Golden West* which is the title of the David Belasco play upon which the opera is based.
- 3 'Manon Lescaut' is also an acceptable answer: Act 4 is set in Louisiana.
- 4 Since 2010 they have been known as the Foster's Edinburgh Comedy Awards
- 5 Ammonia is not an element; it is a compound of nitrogen and hydrogen. The Haber (or Haber-Bosch) process is not used to *extract* ammonia; it is used to synthesize it from its constituent elements.
- 6 'The Sawatch Range' (a smaller range that is part of the Rockies) is an equally acceptable answer.
