Notes and corrections

- ¹ 'Douglas Reeman' is also an acceptable answer: Reeman writes the *Bolitho* novels using the pseudonym Alexander Kent.
- ² There is some uncertainty as to whether Captain McAllister's forename is Horatio or Pete; most sources go for Horatio.
- ³ Ed McKeever won Olympic gold in the men's K1 200m, which is a **kayak** event (as implied by the K prefix). However canoeing and kayaking are usually referred to collectively as 'canoe (sprint) racing', so it would seem that either answer is acceptable.
- There were three re-makes of *The War of the Worlds* released in 2005; Gene Barry appears in the one directed by Steven Spielberg.
 'Actor' is nowadays used to refer to male or female performers, so 'Ann Robinson' (no, not that one) is an equally correct answer, as she also appeared in both versions.
- 5 Conservative Central Office left Smith Square in 2003. The party's Campaign Headquarters are currently at 30 Millbank, SW1.
- 6 Walker's full real name was Autry DeWalt Mixon, Jr.
- 7 The <u>question setting guidelines</u> state: Don't be too obvious with pairings: this can give an unfair advantage to the team getting the second of a pair, allowing them to predict the question they are likely to receive (and therefore to begin working 'in advance' on the answer).

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
