Notes and corrections

- 1 The team going first were asked both Olympic football questions (3 and 25). Likewise their opponents got both 'political history' questions (2 and 28). Question setters are reminded to ensure that pairings are correct: one question of each pair should be even-numbered, the other odd-numbered.
- Whilst they are commonly associated with Russia, blini can be found in the cuisine of most countries in eastern Europe.
- Baklava is associated with the cuisine of many countries besides Turkey, including Greece, Iran and Syria as well as most Balkan countries and former Soviet Republics.
- 4 'London' is a correct answer to this question. Question setters are reminded that location questions should state how specific an answer is required: in this case instead of the general term 'where' it would have been better to ask 'In which London thoroughfare...' or 'In which area of London...'.
- 5 Sir Don Bradman also made two triple centuries against England. He scored 334 in 1930 and a mere 304 in 1934, both at Headingley.
- In cooking terms *panocha* has more than one meaning (as well as a vulgar, non-culinary one in Spanish-speaking countries). In addition to a type of sugar it can also be a fudge-like confectionery, a Mexican porridge or a type of flour.

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
