Notes and corrections

- 1 Ivan the Terrible lived from 1530 to 1584.
- 2 Elvis actually belonged to Lennon's mother.
- There is no rank in the British army that uses three crowns as its insignia. The insignia of a captain is <u>three Bath stars</u> (commonly known as 'pips').
- 4 The English Derby is run at Epsom, not Ascot.
- 5 *Carry On Doctor* was set in Borough County Hospital. St Swithin's Hospital was the setting for *Doctor in the House* (and sequels).
- 6 Proby was 'prominent' from the 1960s, rather than the 1950s.
- 7 The estate of Dumbarton Oaks is in Washington DC, not Washington State.

- 8 The Cisco Kid's horse was called Diablo. Scout was Tonto's horse in *The Lone Ranger*.
- 9 Shropshire and Wiltshire are both landlocked and are almost identical in size, so either would seem to be an acceptable answer.
- 10 The title *London* is given to Vaughn Williams's symphony number 2, not 4.

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
