Notes and corrections

Gamay is used to produce the vast majority (about 98%) of Beaujolais wines, but other grape varieties (such as Chardonnay) may be used.

- 2 Most Sancerre (about 80%) is produced from Sauvignon Blanc, but about 20% of production uses the Pinot Noir grape.
- 3 The Corncrake is also known as the Landrail.
- 4 Most sources give the number of people rescued as nine.
- Most occupations/fields of activity have more than one patron saint. Equally acceptable answers to this question are 'Catherine of Alexandria', 'Lawrence of Rome' and 'Raymond of Penyafort'.
- 6 'Saint Nicholas' is also an acceptable answer.
- 7 Reynolds was a co-founder and first President of the Royal Academy (of Arts). The Royal Society is a scientific institution founded in 1660, more than sixty years before Reynolds was born.
- In the UK version, the victim is **Doctor** (David) Black. In the US version the victim is known as Mr. John Boddy.
- 9 Hel is a god**dess**. Some sources also refer to Loki as the Norse god of the underworld.
