- 1. The correct names of the airports are Portela and Malpensa.

- 4. The American War of Independence is generally regarded to have taken place between the Battles of Lexington and Concord in April 1775 and the signing of the Treaty of Paris in September 1783. Lord North was Prime Minister for the vast majority of this time, but three other Prime Ministers also had short terms in office: The Marquess of Rockingham, The Earl of Shelburne and the Duke of Portland.
- 5. The full title of the Stephen King novella is Rita Hayworth and Shawshank Redemption.
- 6. The Reynolds painting commonly referred to as *The Three Graces* is actually called *Three Ladies Adorning a Term of Hymen.* Several other artists have painted works called *The Three Graces*, including Raphael, Rubens and Lucas Cranach the Elder.
