Notes

1. Question setters are free to pair questions for knockout matches if they wish, but there is no requirement to do so. Pairing questions requires a significant effort, so why 'waste' them on a knockout match?
2. The correct title is *Foucault's Pendulum*
3. Although Siena's is by far the best known, it isn't the only Italian city to stage a *Palio* that involves horse racing. Cagliari, Parma and Asti are also correct answers, but obviously don't fit the theme.
4. A number of teams commented that the answer to this question was given away in the first half of the pair. Although at first glance/hearing it may *seem* that way, this is not the case. The only things 'given away' in the first question are that Agamemnon and Menelaus were brothers and that Menelaus was married to Clytemnestra's half-sister (Helen of Troy). The first question does **not** say that Agamemnon and Clytemnestra were married.
5. Presumably a typo or auto-correct problem. The canal opened in **1914**.
6. There is more than one correct answer to this question as Palmerston began his political career as a Tory, then joined the Whigs and finally became leader of the newly-formed Liberal party.
7. The band took their name from Maximo Gomez Park, which is a popular meeting place for Cuban ex-pats in Little Havana, a district of Miami.
8. 'The Curragheen River' (a tributary of the Lee) is also a correct answer.

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
