Notes

1. Chesterfield didn't reach the semi-finals of **both** competitions in 1997. They 'only' got to the semis of the FA Cup where, after a replay, they were beaten by Middlesbrough, who **did** reach the semi-finals (and final) of both competitions in 1997. Chesterfield were knocked out of the 1996–97 League Cup in the first round by a certain Stockport County, who then progressed to the semi-finals where they lost to Middlesbrough.
2. Rummaniyeh is a pomegranate, aubergine and lentil stew, so it wouldn't be unreasonable also to accept 'aubergine' (which is a fruit) as a correct answer.
3. More accurately, after Malham Tarn Semerwater is the second-largest **naturally-occurring** lake in **North** Yorkshire. The largest natural lake in 'all Yorkshire' is Hornsea Mere in the East Riding, which is about three times the size of Malham Tarn. There are also several man-made lakes (i.e. reservoirs) throughout Yorkshire that are larger than Semerwater.

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
