- 1. At the time of asking Ruth Davidson was on maternity leave, so an equally-acceptable answer is 'Jackson Carlaw', the Deputy Leader acting as interim leader in her absence.
- 2. For reasons best known to themselves the setters often use an '*Identify*' introduction to written rounds. This **can** be confusing to participants when there is a theme, i.e. is 'identifying things' the theme, or is there a theme/connection linking the answers that have been 'identified'?
- 3. His title—Earl of Chatham—is an equally-acceptable answer, but obviously doesn't fit the theme.
- 4. The wording of the question *might* suggest that Campbell-Bannerman was Prime Minister at the time of his death. He actually resigned from office almost three weeks earlier, but continued to live at 10 Downing Street.

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
