- 2. Cadmium, which also produces a brick-red flame, would appear to be an equally acceptable answer.
- 3. Setters should be aware of the <u>question-setting guideline</u> that if the word linked to the theme/connection is in a person's first name, the question should specify that the full name is required. Questions 31, 32, 37, 38 and 39 should, but don't, have this indication.

This is the **fifth time** that this reminder has been given to question setters **this season**. If teams disagree with the question-setting guidelines they should propose a change at the AGM, rather than simply ignoring them.

- 4. The film was made/released in 1999, but the Oscar was awarded in 2000.

- 5. Several other elements produce a green flame; whether these qualify as **apple** green is somewhat subjective.

- 7. While Ailsa Craig is the *traditional* source, the Trefor Granite Quarry in Wales is another. It supplies curling stone granite exclusively to the Canada Curling Stone Company, which has been producing stones since 1992 and supplied the stones for the 2002 Winter Olympics.

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
