Notes

- 1. The novel was published in 1886, not 1893. Also, the same question was used as recently as Week 8.
- 2. There is a discrepancy between Universal Coordinated Time (based on the slightly irregular rotation of the earth) and International Atomic Time. Roughly every 20 months this is corrected by inserting a 'leap second', which involves adding a seventh pip to the time signal, so 'seven' is arguably also a correct answer. Adding the word 'normally' to the question would resolve any ambiguity.
- 3. It's probably **not** a good idea to accept just the city name, as Los Angeles has **two** NBA teams—the other team being the LA Clippers.
- 4. As there were two painters named Hans Holbein (father and son), the strict answer should be Hans Holbein **the Younger**.
- 5. Egypt also has a border with Gaza, whose legal status is a very sensitive issue. Gaza is a territory of Palestine, which is not a member state of the United Nations but **is** recognised as a state by most other countries. Since the statehood of Gaza is not universally accepted, restricting the answer to those countries that are members of the UN would remove any ambiguity.
- 6. While the states in question appear rectangular on a 2-dimensional map they are in fact trapezoids due to the curvature of the Earth. Further information can be found in this fascinating article.

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
