Notes

- The collective name of these laws is simply 'Gas Laws'. The term 'Ideal Gas Law' (aka 'Perfect Gas law' or 'General Gas equation') is a single equation that connects Boyle's law, Charles's law, and Avogadro's law.
- 2. The administrative county of North Riding of Yorkshire was abolished in 1974. The county is now known as North Yorkshire.
- 3. The answer is open to interpretation. If the Severn catchment area includes the Warwickshire Avon, Wye and Bristol Avon, it exceeds the Humber catchment.
- 4. The answer depends on the definition of *premier* venue. According to <u>www.visitbradford.com</u>, the Alhambra is regarded as the North's premier touring venue; however, St George's Hall has a larger capacity.
- 5. It must be assumed that this question refers to the **Academy** Award (Oscar). Also, the Oscar presented in 2023 is for films released in 2022, so it is correctly referred to as the 2022 Academy Award.
- 6. The bridge is commonly known as the Britannia Bridge, not the Britannia Tubular Bridge.
- 7. This is a repeat of Question 19.
