Notes

- 1. The original members of the Humblebums were Billy Connolly and Tam Harvey. After Gerry Rafferty joined they performed as a trio, with Harvey leaving soon after. It's debatable how 'famous' Tam Harvey is, but he would seem to be an acceptable answer.
- 2. St Pancras Station was originally designed by William Henry Barlow.
- 3. This question is a bit misleading as Galileo did not discover the pendulum. Rather he discovered its properties, crucially isochronism, which makes a pendulum useful as a timekeeper.
- 4. Stevenson died in 1894 leaving two novels unfinished: *Weir of Hermiston*, published in 1896, and *St. Ives*, published in 1897 and completed by Arthur Quiller-Couch in 1898.
- 5. The Spanish word for 'liver' is hígado. The Welsh words for 'liver' seem to be afu, hafu or iau, but not lau.
- 6. Eliot died in 1965, not 1985.
- 7. Jack Ryan has also been played on film by Chris Pine.
- 8. Questions 63 and 70 should have been reversed to correct a pairing error.
- 9. Bombín is a masculine noun in Spanish, so the question should say 'el/un bombín'.
- 10. A league member with expert knowledge comments: You would find it difficult to synthesise uric acid simply from glycine. A better phrasing might have been 'What amino acid did Horbaczewski react with urea to synthesise uric acid?'
