- 4. This answer seems to have got a bit garbled. The correct answer is Bedford County Gaol.
- 5. 'Granny's bonnet' is an equally acceptable answer.
- 6. Beatrix Potter owned several properties/tracts of land in Cumbria. By far the best known of these is Hill Top in Near Sawrey, so it might have been better to mention in the question that this was **not** the answer being sought.
- 7. 'Sloe' is an equally acceptable answer.
- 8. In some parts of the UK a gill is half a pint, so 'ten' is also an acceptable answer.
- 9. The Jubilee Line is coloured silver, to commemorate the silver jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II.
