Notes

- 1. It is practically impossible to assess the educational background of 17 post-war Prime Ministers in 30 seconds, which effectively reduces the answer to a guess.
- 2. Although still used in informal conversion, the centigrade scale has been superseded by degrees Celsius when used scientifically.
- 3. Gabriel Attal is Prime Minister of France, not the President.
- 4. More accurately Holi is celebrated as 'the festival of colours, love and spring'.
- 5. Since forenames are not usually required, it should have been specified that the full name was required.
- 6. The kinkajou is also native to Mexico and Central America, so North America is also an acceptable answer.
- 7. Triassic is the *first* of the periods of the Mesozoic Era, coming *before* the Jurassic. The last period (and the correct answer) is the Cretaceous period.
- 8. Australia is an equally acceptable answer.
